
PREFECTS, POWER FM and THE PRESIDENT'S AWARD

This is the first time in the College's History that we have had Gold Award recipients of this prestigious international youth development programme. I strongly endorse the President's Award and sincerely hope more St Petrians will undertake their Bronze, Silver and Gold awards in the years to come.

These lockers have also been equipped with 2-pin plug power points which will allow our students to charge their devices. St Peter's College has installed 600 lockers hence each student will be allocated his/her own locker. Only the Grade 8-11 students will be allocated lockers for Term 3.

Cameras have been installed for security and linked to these areas thus further enhancing the security in these areas.

Padlocks are available from the School Shop at R110, please note that the students may only use these padlocks. Furthermore, there will be an annual deposit of R50 which will be reflected on your College account. The locker allocation will be done this Monday, 12 October.

World Challenge to India – Ms Meyer's Group

Our world challenge team spent 16 days in India that can only be described as difficult but worth it. We started our journey at 22:00 on 9 August at O.R. Tambo. Flew eight hours to Dubai and then three to Delhi. We then took three metro trains from the airport to the old Delhi train station.

After being greeted with the cruel humidity and over 30 degree weather we walked onto the train platform and met our new best friends for the next few hours: Rats. At 23:00 we walked onto the sleeper train where we would spend six hours.

We arrived at Kathgadam station at 06:00 the next morning where we were surrounded by the most beautiful scenery and mountains most of us had ever seen. A two hour jeep trip to Mountain Quail Camp ensued and we were then met by everyone's new favourites: Tea and Toast.

Four days at Mountain Quail while we acclimatised and then began our project.

A full day of carrying bricks down a mountain, then walking back up to get more bricks, to walk back down again. We made gutters to catch rain water as well as two tanks to store the water and a rubbish incinerator. We then began a four day trek. Nothing can describe those four days other than beautiful scenery, bright green mountains, RAIN and leeches.



Another day of travelling on public buses to Rishikesh (and our first shower in four days). The next day we travelled to Hariduar and at 00:50, after a few hours walking along the Ganges River during a festival and hearing our first English song in a few days, we got on another sleeper train to New Delhi train station and from there to Agra.

In Agra we saw the Taj Mahal, Agra Fort and the girls got henna done. After 3 days we drove back to Delhi and spent the evening in a hotel and the next morning left for the airport to end our journey at 08:50 on 24 August in the same place we started... O.R. Tambo International Airport with new friends and amazing memories.

Emi Jozela's Exchange Experience

After exams I moved forward with an exciting journey in my life as I had the opportunity to go on an exchange programme in Argentina. The first two days of my journey I stayed in the capital city Buenos Aires with three other girls from Joburg. It was a bright city with vibrant colors all over and there they say the city never sleeps.

From there I moved provinces and went to my host family in Sante Fe and stayed in Funes with an amazing family who made me feel at home from day one. I went to a school called Collegio San Bartolome which was in the city Rosario and was also a 30 minute drive every morning. From my experience I gathered that school in South Africa is a lot harder and we get far too much homework.

The meals are different as I would eat breakfast at 06:00 which would usually be a small portion of cereal or a slice of toast with something sweet such as a spread which they call 'dulce de leche' which is very similar to caramel. We would then snack in between school hours and then usually eat a meal at about 12:30. Again snack in between till we ate dinner only at 22:00.

Being there was unforgettable because I wasn't a South African 16 year old anymore as I was forced to be more independent which felt awesome because I was able to walk anywhere I wanted, go shopping at any time and catch taxis from here to there.



I remember the one time it was completely strange to me as I was invited to a fifteenth birthday party which started at 21:00 and ended at 04:00 the next morning. Now a fifteenth party is very big there as some people get the opportunity to host a huge event celebrating their adulthood or traveling overseas with friends to places such as Miami. So at the party we had a blast and then we caught a taxi home and when we were home the whole house was fast asleep so we had cake with loads of dulce de leche and then went to bed at about 05:00.

While I was there I gathered that Argentinians are a very passionate people, they are passionate about their sport as well as their country. We could see this because they had paint all over walls and some even painted their houses of the club colors. There are flags everywhere. So yes when I'm finished with school I'll be back to visit.
